- COVID has touched us all
 - 533,917 cases in Wisconsin, 5,699 deaths
 - Changed our lifestyles and social interactions, short & long term
 - Many of us feel continual low-levels of anxiety and worry
 - We will be dealing with the economic, social, and personal fallout from this pandemic for years

Wisconsin still leads all US states for Chapter 12 farm bankruptcy filings (year ending 9/30/20)



SNAP participation rate in Wisconsin jumped from 10.4% to 17.4% in 1 month (Mar to Apr 2020)



2020 Farm Income Situation

• Farm income up 21-41% from 2019 after several lackluster years

- 1. Tremendous government support, \$46.5 Billion nationally, more than \$1.1 Billion for WI farmers from CFAP and other programs
- 2. Recovering commodity prices as the year closed out
- Many farms financially recovering after several years of tight or negative margins
- Dairy farm attrition rate fell, almost back at its "long run average"
- Good year for crop production, Land values holding or up 2-3%
- Loan delinquency rates steady, Farm debt at banks fell 8%

2021 Farm Income Situation: Hope & Uncertainty

- Several reasons to be hopeful for 2021
 - Commodity price trends and margins looking profitable
 - Value of good ag land up: ag still a good investment
 - Wisconsin dairy farm attrition rates almost back to "normal"
 - US food system has adapted to the covid pandemic
- Uncertainties creating volatile markets
 - How fast will the world economy recover? Vaccines and variants
 - How have consumer preferences changed?
 - What's really going on in China and other export markets?
